A. General Relief Plan

Mr. Jordan presented the FY'27 General Relief Plan with no changes. Harrell was available for questions; however, none were asked.

B. Fraud Plan

Mr. Jordan presented FY'27 Fraud Plan & Commonwealth Attorney Memorandum of Agreement with no changes. Ellis was available for questions; however, none were asked.

C. Legislation

2. "VLSSE 2026 Bill Tracking" as related to Social Services a list of proposed House and Senate bills, the committee assigned, and position provided.

Department Director's Report

A. Information and Program Management Modernization Update

Mr. Jordan and Cofield briefed the Board on the Virginia Department of Social Services Information Technology (VDSS IT) communications. The information provided is as follows:

- Mr. Jordan met with the State's new Director of Technology.
- State IT is currently delayed in processing access form approvals.
- The building is experiencing heating problems, causing some areas to be in the low 60s while others are in the upper 80s. Clients have complained about the cold in the lobby. Maintenance has been out many times, and we believe the issue stems from the age of the building. County policy does not allow the use of portable heaters.

B. Budget IPR

Mr. Jordan briefed the Board on the Agency Budget. The information provided is as follows:

1. "Local Year-To-Date Budget Report" reviewed.
2. "State Budget Balance Report YTD" reviewed.
3. "IOW-DSS Monthly Expenditures" report reviewed revealing expenses in each budget line by reimbursable or non-reimbursable funds and by Federal, State, Local, or Local-Only match rates. Local match rate is at 18.2% and unmatched Local is at 0.2% coming in well below other localities. State 2025 JLARC report is not available yet. FY'27 Federal match rates will decrease pushing a higher match requirement to State and Local.
4. "FY'26 Mid-Year Review Fund Report" depicting State funding requests status, returns, and awarded incentives. Fostering Care, budget line 811, approved \$10,389; Adoption Subsidy, budget line 812, approved \$2,826; Adult Companion Services, budget line 833, denied \$76,656; Respite Care, budget line 864, returned \$563; Family Partnership Meeting, budget line 855, awarded \$300; Kinship, budget line 855, awarded \$250.

C. Agency Staffing/Operations

1. "Fleet Inventory Report" usage reviewed.
2. "Benefits Performance Indicator Report" reviewed. Medicaid cases must be reviewed biannually beginning in October. The main contributors to Virginia's

11% SNAP error rate are client self-declaration, self-reporting, and self-certification.

3. "SNAP Monthly Participation Report" with household cost data briefed. 1,854 households and 3,409 persons were served with a total issuance of \$560,632.
4. Agency currently has 71 childcare cases, 92 children authorized with a 112 target.
5. "In-Home and Prevention Safe Measures - Eastern Region" results reviewed.
6. "CPS Data – December" results reviewed. Isle of Wight Referral Screen-out Rate is 38%, exceeding Federal standards. Errors and usefulness of report discussed.
7. "LDSS Annual Profile Report" provided. Data reviewed in each category: ALICE, Population, Poverty, Unemployment, Benefit, Birth, Health Insurance, Family Services, Spending, and Staffing. FY'24 Locality Revenue \$83,980,852 and Cost \$1,449,131; Match Rates: Federal 54.9%, State 43.4%, Local 1.5%, and unmatched Local 0.3%
8. "LTSS Screening Compliance Report - December" for Isle of Wight and Eastern Region reviewed. Number of screenings and their timeliness depicted for Adult, Child, and Totals
9. Thank you letters to Mr. Jordan from Glenn Youngkin, Governor, and Janet Kelly, Secretary of Health and Human Services, shared.
10. "DARS State FY'25 Annual Report" provided.
11. CommonHelp redesign information sheet shared.
12. "SNAP Integrity" PowerPoint presentation on State's plan for advanced automation to increase worker productivity and reduce SNAP errors.
13. "Fiscal Impact Analysis of Growth Scenarios" report on Isle of Wight County economics briefed. Social Services impact was not included in the study.



HB 301	Schuyler T. VanValkenburg	Exemptions from garnishment; minimum protected account balance; certain benefit payments; procedure for financial institutions. Requires certain financial institutions to automatically exempt from garnishment (i) a minimum protected account balance, defined in the bill as the combined total of not more than \$1,000 in a judgment debtor's account or across multiple accounts in the same financial institution, and (ii) a protected amount of certain benefit payments, defined in the bill, that have been deposited into the account via direct deposit or electronic deposit within the two months immediately preceding the day before a financial institution commences an account review. The bill describes an account review as a process of examining an account of a judgment conducted by a financial institution upon such financial institution's receipt of a garnishment summons to determine if any eligible benefit payments have been deposited within the applicable time period and, if so, to calculate the total sum of such benefit payments and establish the total as a protected amount that shall be automatically exempt from garnishment. The bill provides that such procedure to automatically exempt such funds shall not apply if the debt arises from a child support or spousal support obligation or if an exemption is otherwise prohibited by law. SB 119	Jennifer D. Carroll Foy	Employee Child Care Assistance Pilot Program. Establishes the Employee Child Care Assistance Pilot Program (the Pilot Program) to provide matching funds in order to incentivize employers to contribute to the child care costs of their employees. The Pilot Program shall be established by the Virginia Early Childhood Foundation (the Foundation), which will establish guidelines and procedures deemed necessary for administration of the Pilot Program. The bill provides that the Foundation shall provide an interim report to the General Assembly by September 1, 2027, and a summative report to the General Assembly by September 1, 2028, on the effectiveness and impact of the Pilot Program. SB 125	Barbara A. Favola	Office of the Children's Ombudsman; powers and duties; report; recommendations. Makes a number of changes to the Office of the Children's Ombudsman. The bill expands the Office's access to certain records and reports and allows the Office to report certain complaints to the Office of the Inspector General. Under the bill, the Office is required to report findings and recommendations related to failures by state agencies to protect children to the Governor or General Assembly upon request. Under current law, such reports are made to the General Assembly. The bill makes certain changes to the Office's reporting and recommendation requirements. Finally, the bill adds and amends several definitions related to the Office. SB 133	Mamie E. Locke	Abused or neglected child; prenatal substance abuse. Specifies that, in the case of an infant affected by in utero substance exposure, evidence of substance exposure in a pregnant or postpartum woman is not solely a "reason to suspect that a child is abused or neglected." The bill requires that evidence of harm or substantial risk of harm to a child and a pregnant woman's compliance adherence to any substance use disorder treatment be included in any report of suspected child abuse or neglect. The bill requires local community services boards to be notified of a finding or diagnosis that a child (i) was born affected by substance abuse or experiencing withdrawal symptoms resulting from in utero drug exposure; (ii) has an illness, disease, or condition attributable to maternal abuse of a controlled substance during pregnancy; or (iii) has a fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. Under the bill, a health care provider is required to provide a pregnant or postpartum woman with certain information and obtain informed consent prior to conducting toxicology or cord blood testing. Finally, the bill provides immunity from any civil or criminal liability or administrative penalty or sanction for a health care provider who does not conduct toxicology or cord blood testing of a child or pregnant or postpartum woman. SB 134	Mamie E. Locke	Public education; early childhood care and education; funding formula calculations; report. Requires the Department of Education to establish and maintain a funding formula for the provision of early childhood care and education services based on cost of quality rate per child, actual data from the prior year, unserved waitlists, and a multiplier based on enrollment and parent demand growth in prior biennia. The bill requires the funding formula to include an estimate of the number of slots to be added to support local or regional economic development efforts and public-private partnerships focused on increasing the supply of child care services, giving priority to localities or regions identified as child care deserts, as determined by the Department pursuant to the requirements set forth in the bill. The bill also contains several provisions relating to the use and appropriation of funds as applicable to the funding formula, including (i) providing that the funding formula shall not obligate the General Assembly to a specific appropriation, (ii) requiring the funding formula to be used to provide information to guide the General Assembly in making decisions about the proportion of parental demand to be addressed and level of appropriation required to address such demand, and (iii) providing that the annual overall funding available for slots shall be subject to appropriation as determined by the General Assembly. Finally, the bill requires the Department to submit to the Commission on Early Childhood Care and Education a report on the data used to calculate the minimum funding and number of slots for the funding formula in accordance with the provisions of the bill. SB 18	Mamie E. Locke	Children; adjudication of delinquency. Specifies that "delinquent child" means a child 11 years of age or older who has committed a delinquent act. Currently, there is no minimum age for a child to be adjudicated delinquent. The bill provides that if a child younger than 11 years of age is found to have committed an act that would be delinquent if committed by a child 11 years of age or older, the child shall not be proceeded upon as delinquent; however, the court may make any orders of disposition authorized for a child in need of services or a child in need of supervision. The bill also provides that any funding that is available to provide services to a child 11 years of age or older who is proceeded upon as delinquent shall also be made available to a child younger than 11 years of age who is found to have committed an act that would be delinquent if committed by a child 11 years of age or older in order to provide such child with the same services. The bill includes in the definition of "child in need of services" a child younger than 11 years of age who has committed an act that would be delinquent if committed by a child 11 years of age or older. The bill adds that a child may be taken into immediate custody when such child is alleged to be in need of services or supervision and there is a clear and substantial danger to the safety of the child's family or the safety of the public. Currently, a child may be taken into immediate custody when such child is alleged to be in need of services or supervision and there is a clear and substantial danger to the child's life or health. Finally, the bill includes in the offense of causing or encouraging acts rendering children delinquent, abused, etc., any person 18 years of age or older, including the parent of any child, who willfully contributes to, encourages, or causes any act, omission, or condition that (i) causes a child younger than 11 years of age to commit an act that would be delinquent if committed by a child 11 years of age or older or (ii) causes any child to participate in or become a member of a criminal street gang in violation of existing law. Under the bill, any person who commits such offense is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor. SB 199	Barbara A. Favola	Employment; paid sick leave; civil penalties. Expands provisions of the Code that currently require one hour of paid sick leave for every 30 hours worked for home health workers to cover all employees of certain private employers and state and local governments. The bill requires that employees who are employed and compensated on a fee-for-service basis accrue paid sick leave in accordance with regulations adopted by the Commissioner of Labor and Industry. The bill provides that employees transferred to a separate division or location remain entitled to previously accrued paid sick leave and that employees retain their accrued paid sick leave under any successor employer. The bill allows employers to provide a more generous paid sick leave policy than prescribed by its provisions and specifies that employees, in addition to using paid sick leave for their physical or mental illness or to care for a family member, may use paid sick leave to seek or obtain certain services or to relocate or secure an existing home due to domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking. SB 2	Jennifer B. Boysko	Paid family and medical leave insurance program; notice requirements; civil action. Requires the Virginia Employment Commission to establish and administer a paid family and medical leave insurance program with benefits beginning January 1, 2029. Under the program, benefits are paid to covered individuals, as defined in the bill, for family and medical leave. Funding for the program is provided through premiums assessed to employers and employees beginning January 1, 2028. The bill provides that the amount of a benefit is 80 percent of the employee's average weekly wage, not to exceed 120 percent of the state weekly wage, which amount is required to be adjusted annually to reflect changes in the statewide average weekly wage. The bill caps the duration of paid leave at 12 weeks in any application year and provides self-employed individuals the option of participating in the program. SB 20	Mamie E. Locke	Early childhood care and education; Child Care Subsidy Program; income-based eligibility for assistance; development and implementation of phased reduction model. Requires the Department of Education to develop and implement a phased reduction model for the Child Care Subsidy Program (the Program) that provides for an assistance phase-out period during which the assistance for which a given family is eligible is incrementally reduced in proportion to the increase in such family's income for the purpose of ensuring that no family receiving child care assistance under the Program experiences a sudden loss in eligibility for assistance as a result of an increase in family income. The bill requires the phased reduction model developed and implemented by the Department to consist of incremental income tiers, with each increase in income tier corresponding to a proportional reduction in the percentage of assistance for which a given family is eligible under the Program. The bill directs the Board of Education to (i) promulgate regulations for the development and implementation of the phased reduction model in accordance with the provisions of the bill and (ii) submit to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services any amendments to the current Child Care and Development Fund Plan for Virginia as are necessary to implement the provisions of the bill. The bill also requires the petitioning parent or custodian to cooperate with any services provided by a local department of social services during the initial investigation by such local department of social services after such petition for relief of care and custody has been filed. SB 21	Mamie E. Locke	Department of Juvenile Justice; transfer of responsibility from Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security to Secretary of Health and Human Resources; stakeholder work group. Directs the Office of the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security and the Office of the Secretary of Health and Human Resources to convene a stakeholder work group to create a plan and recommended timeline for transferring responsibility for the Department of Juvenile Justice from the Secretary of Public Safety and Homeland Security to the Secretary of Health and Human Resources. The bill requires the work group to be composed of interested parties, including representatives from civil liberty organizations, organizations engaged in the daily work of youth justice and violence prevention, formerly incarcerated persons and their families, and mental health experts. The bill directs the work group to submit its plan and recommended timeline for executing the transfer to the Chairs of the House Committee for Courts of Justice, House Committee on Public Safety, Senate Committee for Courts of Justice, and Senate Committee on Rehabilitation and Social Services by November 1, 2026. SB 243	Christopher T. Head	Adult protective services; adult abuse, neglect and exploitation central registry. Creates a central registry of substantiated complaints of adult abuse, neglect, and exploitation to be maintained by the Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services. The bill establishes (i) investigation requirements for local departments of social services related to reports of adult abuse, neglect, and exploitation; (ii) record retention and disclosure requirements for the Department for Aging and Rehabilitative Services and local departments of social services; (iii) notice requirements related to findings by local departments and central registry entries; and (iv) an appeals process to contest the findings of a local department related to substantiated reports of adult abuse, neglect, or exploitation. The bill directs the Commissioner for Aging and Rehabilitative Services to adopt regulations to implement the provisions of the bill and exempts the Commissioner's initial adoption of such regulations from the provisions of the Administrative Process Act. Additionally, the bill prohibits a prospective employer from (i) seeking the wage or salary history of a prospective employee; (ii) relying on the wage or salary history of a prospective employee in determining the wages or salary the prospective employee is to be paid upon hire; (iii) relying on the wage or salary history of a prospective employee in considering the prospective employee for employment; (iv) refusing to interview, hire, employ, or promote a prospective employee or otherwise retaliating against a prospective employee for not providing wage or salary history; and (v) failing or refusing to disclose in each public and internal posting for each job, promotion, transfer, or other employment opportunity the wage, salary, or wage or salary range. The bill establishes a cause of action for an aggrieved prospective employee or employee and provides that an employer that violates such prohibitions is liable to the aggrieved prospective employee or employee for statutory damages between \$1,000 and \$10,000 or actual damages, whichever is greater, reasonable attorney fees and costs, and any other legal and equitable relief as may be appropriate. The FPL used to determine the eligibility income eligibility limits for certain Medicaid covered groups were announced effective **January 13, 2026**. These increased income limits must be used for Medicaid and FAMIS eligibility determinations and renewals processed on or after **January 13, 2026**. Covered groups with income limits that adjust as of July 1 each year (Medically Needy groups, LIFC, and Individuals Under 21) were excluded from this update.

The new income limits were deployed in VaCMS on **February 13, 2026**. Medicaid applications and renewals denied or that resulted in a reduction in covered for excess income from **January 13, 2026 to February 13, 2026** must be **re-evaluated**.

Additionally, income increases due to the 2026 Social Security Title II 2026 cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) are disregarded through February 28, 2026 (M1520.100) when determining the income eligibility of an individual in the following ABD covered groups:

- Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB)
- Special Low-income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB)
- Qualified Individuals (QI)
- ABD with Income £ 80% FPL (ABD 80% FPL)

Medicaid applications and renewals for these covered groups that were denied for excess income from **January 1, 2026 to the present should be re-evaluated**.

STANDARD OPERATING PROCEDURES
IOW-DSS 0426-2

Effective: 04/01/26

- I. Purpose:** The purpose of this policy is to establish guidelines for assigning Family Services Specialists (FSS) to provide shift oversight for:
- Foster children placed in an medical hospital setting while awaiting acute psychiatric placement;
 - Displaced foster children awaiting transition to a foster care placement.
- II. Scope:** This policy applies to all Family Services Specialists assigned to provide in-person shift coverage for children in agency custody who are:
- Awaiting inpatient psychiatric placement; or
 - Awaiting transfer to an identified foster home or other approved placement resource.
- III. Definitions:**
- **Acute Hospital Setting** – A medical hospital providing emergency or short-term stabilization services that is not a long-term psychiatric facility.
 - **Shift Oversight** – Assigned in-person supervision provided by a Family Services Specialist during designated hours (daytime, evening, overnight, or rotating shifts) to ensure communication and stability.
 - **Psychiatric Placement** – Admission to an inpatient psychiatric hospital or psychiatric residential treatment program.
 - **Identified Foster Care Placement** – A foster home or approved placement resource that has been selected and is pending transition, transport, or administrative completion.
 - **Interim Placement Period** – The time between removal or discharge and transfer to a longer-term placement.
- IV. Policy Statement:** When a child in custody of the Isle of Wight Department of Social Services and is placed in an Acute Hospital Setting and requires additional supervision to maintain stability, the agency may assign Family Services Specialists to provide shift oversight coverage. Oversight may be implemented when:

- A child remains in a hospital setting after medical clearance pending psychiatric bed availability.
- A child is awaiting acceptance to an identified foster care placement.
- A child is temporarily housed in an office or other approved short-term arrangement.

The FSS role is supportive and supervisory in nature and does not replace medical providers, foster parents, therapeutic providers, security personnel, or licensed caregivers.

V. Assignment Procedures:

- Shift oversight assignments will be developed and approved by the Family Services Supervisor or Director/Assistant Director.
- Each assignment must include:
 - Defined shift hours (day or evening; overnight shifts may occur on availability of staff and exceptions)
 - Coverage expectations
 - Start date and anticipated duration
 - Location of oversight

VI. Responsibilities of the Family Services Specialist:

During assigned shifts, the FSS shall:

- Emotional & Behavioral Support
 - Provide supportive engagement and reassurance to child
 - Encourage participation in structured, age-appropriate activities
 - Support compliance with rules of the setting
- For children awaiting psychiatric placement:
 - Coordination with hospital staff regarding placement and transfer status
 - Participate in discharge planning discussions when appropriate
 - Provide updates to supervisor

VII. Limitations of Role:

The Family Services Specialist:

- Does not serve as licensed caregiver unless separately credentialed
- Does not replace hospital clinical staff, foster parents, or security personnel
- Shall not transport the child without supervisor authorization

IX. Shift Structure & Coverage:

- Shifts may be scheduled as 2-hour, 3-hour, or 4-hour coverage depending on the age of the child and assessed need.
- Shift coverage, including any gaps between scheduled shifts and the possibility of overnight staffing assignments, shall be determined based on staff availability and operational demands. Coverage decisions will be made at the discretion of the Family Services Supervisor, taking into consideration:
 - Availability of FSS;
 - Competing agency priorities and required assignments; and
 - Duration of interim placement period

While continuous coverage may be provided when operationally necessary, the agency does not guarantee uninterrupted 24-hour staffing. The Family Services Supervisor retains authority to adjust coverage schedules in response to staffing capacity and emergent agency needs.

- Overtime must be pre-approved consistent with agency policy.
- The hospital will be provided with a shift coverage schedule that includes the phone numbers of on-call staff available during times when an FSS is not on site at the hospital.

X. Duration of Oversight:

Shift oversight shall continue until:

- The child is successfully admitted to a psychiatric facility;
- The child transitions to an identified foster care placement;
- The Family Services Supervisor determines enhanced supervision is no longer required; or
- An alternative safety plan is implemented.

XI. Responsibility: All employees are responsible for the information stated above.

XII. History: This is an original policy established on merit increase at IOW-DSS and does not supersede County of Isle of Wight or Commonwealth of Virginia established policies, procedures, guidelines, or regulations.
